

GET AROUND

Feel free to wander the paths and laneways onsite, but please don't go into any fields when gates are shut, to avoid disturbing animals.



Mobility aids available, ask at Tickets.



Many buildings have narrow entrances and low door frames. Please take care as you explore!



We are a dog-friendly site, so you may encounter dogs during your visit. Dogs must be kept on a short lead at all times and cannot enter any of our buildings (except assistance dogs).



Changing Places and Accessible Toilets are available on the Town Route.

ROUTES TO EXPLORE

Town 🏠

400 m - mostly flat - tarmacked streets with some cobbled areas - 10 min walk with 1 hour+ to explore buildings.

A leisurely walk where you can meet our Makers, enjoy a cuppa and purchase unique mementoes.

Field

1 km - steep slope beyond ³⁹ and hills past ⁵⁵ - tarmacked lanes - 15 min walk with 45 min+ to explore buildings.

A longer walk with steep sections will take you through the heart of the Museum.

Wood की

950 m – very steep path at ⁽⁴³⁾ – gravel, grass and mud (first section not suitable for buggies or most wheelchairs) – 20 min walk with 45 min+ to explore buildings.

Our more challenging route. You can bypass the first section and pick up the trail again in time to meet the pigs at 45.

WEAVERS

You'll find our weavers at work with wool at the back of the Draper's Shop 31 or with linen at the country loom. 39



BASKETMAKER

Our basketmaker designs and weaves amazing willow creations - from baskets to boats - in his workshop. 20

There will be at least three of these makers for you to meet at the Museum today.



PRINTERS

Our printers cut intricate original designs and assemble rows of perfect type at Baird's Print Shop. 16



BLACKSMITHS

Follow the ring of the anvil to the forges 24 54 or Spade Mill 44, where our blacksmiths create beautiful modern craft using traditional methods.



CARPENTER

Our carpenter makes and repairs all kinds of wooden items for the home. Drop by his shop 6 and learn about the traditional tools he uses.



BAKERS

Don't miss the taste of fresh soda or wheaten, straight off the griddle at the Rectory. 25 Our bakers have honed their skills to cook over fire for you.

KITCHEN GARDENS

We grow food and share knowledge through our patchwork of kitchen gardens. You can take part in these spaces with The Conservation Volunteers. Visit recent projects at Duncrun 48, Coshkib 43 and Corradreenan. 45



HERITAGE BREEDS

The museum has a working farm, where our farmers nurture animals from distinctive heritage breeds. Meet pigs, cows, sheep, horses, donkeys, chickens, geese and goats as you explore our Field and Wood routes. 39 - 51



TREE NURSERY

Our partner, The Conservation Volunteers, grow native trees onsite to supply planting projects all over Ireland. You can see them at work and join in at the Tree Nursery ⁵⁶ (please note this path is soft, uneven and steep in places).
